Each year in the United States, 14 million people become infected with Human Papilloma Virus (HPV). According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, HPV causes 31,500 cases of cancer in men and women each year. Individuals between the ages of 9-26 can be vaccinated against HPV; but this preventative measure is being under utilized. Dental providers are encouraged to gather more knowledge about this phenomenon so that they can discuss the HPV vaccine with their patients and answer questions related to HPV and the HPV vaccine. Presenters will cover the biology of HPV, vaccination guidelines, HPV-related head and neck cancers, and the dental community’s role in HPV cancer prevention. Guidelines for identifying malignances in the oral cavity will also be discussed.

Doctor Caskey is an associate professor of internal medicine and pediatrics at the University of Illinois at Chicago College of Medicine and chief of the division of Academic Internal Medicine at UIC. She is a health services researcher and her research focus on investigating novel mechanisms to positively impact and incentivize preventive health behaviors which result in improved health outcomes. Her recent projects include employing principles of behavior economics to improve adolescent HPV vaccination and studying alternate HPV vaccine delivery mechanisms to improve adolescent vaccination. She is recognized locally and nationally for her research. Dr Caskey has an appointment at UIC's school of public health in the division of maternal child health where she teaches courses on health outcomes. She is a member of the UIC Cancer Center where she collaborates on efforts to reduce the incidence of cervical cancer.

Dr. Mark Lingen, DDS, PhD, FRC, Path. Dir. University of Chicago

Dr. Lingen is a professor of pathology at the university of Chicago Medicine. He completed his dental school training oral Maxillofacial Pathology residency and PhD in cellular and Molecular pathology at Northwestern University. Dr Lingen is the director of the UC Oral Pathology Outreach Biopsy Service and the Director of UC Head and Neck Pathology Fellow Training program. He's the editor and chief of the Journal Oral Surgery, Oral Medicine, Oral Pathology, Oral Radiology (triple O). His research dealing with molecular diagnostics, and oral cancer prevention has resulted in more than 170 publications. Dr Lingen is a diplomat of the American Board of Oral Maxillofacial Pathology and is a fellow of the American College of Dentists, the International College of Dentists, and the Royal College of Pathologist.

Dr. Preeti K. Parhar, MD, MPH, Northwestern Medicine
